

Child and Family Services

Our goal is to have communities where children grow up safe from abuse, neglect and dependency, where adults are protected from domestic violence, and where parents can be strengthened in their capacity to keep their family safe.

SOME OF OUR SERVICES

- Families and children may receive parent education, budgeting help, crisis intervention, sex abuse treatment and mental health therapy
- When necessary and possible (subject to appropriate background checks), children are placed in the care of relatives
- Adoption services are available for children who cannot be returned to their biological parents
- Foster children who transition out of our care at 18 years of age may participate in the Transition to Adult Living program—designed to promote self-sufficiency
- Domestic violence services—from counseling to shelters

Quick Facts:

- 36,447 complaints of child abuse were received last year
- 19,878 complaints were investigated; 8,268 were found to have some merit
- The most common complaints involved physical abuse, end domestic violence
- Neglect accounted for 36% of children served in custody
- 1,758 kids entered foster care
- Substance abuse was a contributing factor in 56% of new foster care cases
- 16,825 clients received home-based services
